For Rural Lands, 2023 has been a year of excitement and growth. Executive Director Robin Sears jumped into the job, getting to know many of you in the community and moving WRL ahead in many ways. The other staff, Cathy Talarico, Daniel Gura and Dana Williams, continued to do what they do best. Cathy worked diligently as the year

drew to a close in preparing the office and all involved with the eventuality of her retirement in early 2024. Daniel, with interns and volunteers who orbit around him, conducted several major and countless minor actions to keep our trails safe and habitats functioning well. Dana energized and expanded our programs and brought a new look to our publicity.

We are grateful to all supported our purchase of farmland on Oblong Road in 2023. We are especially grateful to our peers at The Trustees of Reservations who purchased a Conservation Restriction on it, ensuring that this land is conserved in perpetuity. Its' protection ensures the provision of valuable family resources, ecological services in the watershed, and a fabulous viewshed.

Children in programs at Sheep Hill regaled their parents and caregivers with tales of defending the Nature Kingdom from intruders and the adventures of frogs caught, or almost caught, at Josiah's Pond. Our trails were improved by the many volunteers

clearing fallen debris. And the trails were used by many more volunteers who led walks and hikes around town and the firefly and owl evenings at our special Sheep Hill.

And if you add the value of the health benefits of being in nature, the livelihood security related to preserving farmland, and the educational gains from counting tadpoles, I venture that Rural Lands makes a significant impact

on the local economy and social fabric.

It is an exciting time to be a member of WRL. Whether you are a butterfly afficionado, parent of a nature-curious child, hiker, or landowner with a goal of good stewardship, we welcome you to engage with us and enjoy the resources we offer—land, trails, and programs. The current team of staff and board has now completed several land conservation projects, and we have new ones in line. Our programs enjoyed record attendance levels. And we are working through outreach and facilities improvements to welcome and motivate a broader section of our community to enjoy the outdoors.

Partnerships and collaboration reinforce the social fabric in our community, and we appreciate opportunities in 2023 to participate. We honored the original inhabitants of this region, the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohicans, through the installation of informational panels at our Cold Spring site and hosting a luncheon organized by Williams College students on Indigenous Peoples' Day. We partnered with the international Tupelo Press on an arts and literature review journal, Northern Berkshire Landscapes: A Celebration, with additional collaboration from the Clark Institute of Art and Northern Berkshire Community Coalition.


WRL stayed connected to regional peer and professional networks, with Programs Director Dana Williams and I attending the annual summit of the Association for Nature Center Administrators (ANCA) in Maine. WRL Stewardship Director Daniel Gura and board member Brian Cole became Keyston Cooperators through the Mass Woods training program in forest ecology and management, wildlife management and land conservation. Our active participation with peer organizations through two Regional Conservation Partnership programs informs our decisions on habitat management and priority conservation areas.

Our mission guides all that we do to serve the local community through land conservation, nature education, and outdoor recreation. Please join me in thanking our members—you, your peers and neighbors—and encouraging others to join in our efforts to advance this worthy mission.

Land Conservation and Stewardship

In 2023, two land conservation projects came to fruition. We were fortunate to acquire ten acres of farmland on Oblong Road at Mailbox Hill and secure its preservation with a conservation restriction held by The Trustees of Reservations. We also assisted the Hart family of South Williamstown with the conservation by MassWildlife of 100 acres of prime forestland.

Stewardship Director Daniel Gura and Williams College student Ana Sofia Roldan conducted a complete monitoring of our property boundaries to map the incidence of invasive plants in the first half of 2023. This inventory will help guide habitat restoration efforts in the years ahead. Daniel also led his summer trail interns Al Lake and Ellie Davis, also from Williams College, and two groups of volunteers on an arduous trail infrastructure repair at Pine Cobble. They installed timber steps to stabilize the soil and prevent further damage to the trail and its surrounding habitat. We hope you'll enjoy the hike!

Programs

We held 62 nature-based programs and events in 2023, engaging 1001 participants, including toddlers and their parents through the Family Center of Northern Berkshire County and neighbors learning about land stewardship through our Knowing Your Landscape series. Through our programs for children we endeavor to motivate local and regional families to get their kids outdoors to bathe in nature, experience the elements, and discover their passions through play outdoors. Adults and teens deepened their acquaintance with nature on our bird watching outings, butterfly walks, and plant identification strolls. Others sought a physical challenge, gorgeous views, and nature interpretation by volunteer leaders on our series of 14 guided hikes.

We especially enjoy casually bringing community together at Sheep Hill to enjoy conversation, music, and food at community events, and, yes, sometimes a bit of work at our bi-annual site clean-ups. Your participation in all that we do motivates our creativity and efforts.
